Title: Modern War and Gray Zones: Guidelines for Small States

Abstract

The armed conflicts witnessed in the two decades of the 21st century have compelled us to

adopt a new perspective on modern warfare and state security. The nature of conflict has

undergone a noticeable transformation, wherein a wide range of actors employ both

conventional and unconventional tactics to exploit vulnerabilities within states. These actors

operate below the threshold of armed conflict, giving rise to the concept of the gray zone - an

intermediate space between stable peace and open warfare. It is crucial to acknowledge that

modern wars encompass both violent conflicts and the complexities of the gray zone.

Consequently, this form of conflict presents significant challenges to the security of states.

This article focuses on presenting the outcomes of a research project conducted within ISMS

War Studies Group, developed by a team of international experts, resulting in the book

"Modern War and Gray Zones: Guidelines for Small States." The research findings indicate

that specific problems deserve particular attention, including (i) concepts and context of

modern war and gray zone conflicts faced by small countries; (ii) defense policies, strategies,

and operations; (iii) deterring and managing violence that poses a threat to small states; (iv)

security for societies and peoples. Furthermore, the aim of this research is to familiarize mid-

career professionals with new and emerging challenges threatening state security, offering

them an opportunity to design strategies and develop solutions for navigating the complexities

of the gray zone and contemporary conflicts.
