

ISMS CONFERENCE 2023

The annual International Society of Military Sciences conference is rapidly approaching, and this year, the Royal Danish Defence College has the pleasure of hosting the conference at DGI Byen in Copenhagen, Denmark, on the 6-8th of November 2023.

The conference hosts esteemed researchers, academics, military personnel and various interested people worldwide. The conference aims to enhance networks for creating, developing, exchanging and diffusing research and knowledge about war, conflict management and peace support efforts. The networking and knowledge sharing will take place through academic presentations and discussions. The speakers are invited to formal dinners at Frederiksberg Palace and Naval Base Holmen in the evening.

This year, the ISMS has received a vast amount of abstracts, of which more than one hundred have been selected to be presented in ten different working groups within the subject areas of war studies; military history; military technology; leadership, command and control and basic competences; military law and ethics; security and defence policy; armed forces and society; defence management and economics; military education; and strategy. The speakers will initially be given 15-20 minutes to present their research and findings in the working groups, after which 15-20 minutes for questions and discussions will follow.

The topics of the abstracts within the ten working groups are multifarious. Several abstracts evolve around different aspects of the war between Ukraine and Russia and its spill-over effects on the international security scene. For example, one abstract will touch upon the strategic partnership between Russia and China, and another will focus on cyber warfare and which initial insights can be drawn from the war. Other abstracts revolve around current and significant military topics such as Multi-Domain Operations, the use of UAV and counter UAV on the battlefield, disinformation, nuclear warfare, etc. Furthermore, classical issues, such as the applicability of military history and leadership, will also be presented. For example, one abstract will display NATO commanders' use of military history, and another will talk about how to rethink leadership in the context of MDO. Therefore, there are numerous options for obtaining knowledge and insights about various interesting topics.

Three prominent keynote speakers from Denmark will attend and give speeches during the conference. General (ret.) Knud Bartels will initiate on November 7 at 0915-1000 AM at DGI Byen. Lieutenant General (ret.) Michael Ankers Lollesgaard will act as Dinner Speaker during the official conference dinner at Naval Base Holmen on the evening of November 7. Dr Peter Viggo Jakobsen will conclude the conference on November 8 at 0230-0330 PM.

The Royal Danish Defence College looks forward to hosting the conference and welcoming the speakers in Copenhagen, Denmark. The final program of the presentations of the abstracts is in the making and will be sent out shortly. Late submissions are possible - please get in touch with the ISMS.

KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



Gen. (ret.) Knud Bartels

Gen. (ret.) Knud Bartels, born in 1952, joined the Danish Army in 1972 as a private. He has attended the Royal Danish Military Academy, the Royal Danish Defence College, l'École Supériure de Guerre in Paris and the US Army War College in Carlisle. He has commanded company, battalion, brigade and division and has served in higher staff positions nationally and in NATO Headquarters. Gen. (ret.) Bartels was appointed Danish Chief of Defence in 2009 (until 2011) and unanimously elected Chairman of the NATO Military Committee in 2011, where he sat until 2015. Furthermore, he has been the Danish representative in the EU's military committee. He retired in 2015 and became Adjunct Professor in military history at the Royal Danish Defence College. Gen. (ret.) Bartels is married to Mrs. Inge Vansteenkiste, and they have their home in Belgium.



Gen. (ret.) Michael A. Lollesgaard

Lt. Gen. (ret.) Michael Lollesgaard was commissioned in 1984, has held battalion, brigade and division and has extensive command, experience in international operations. Most notably, he was operations staff officer in the US-led Multinational Division North in Bosnia-Herzegovina. Later joined the Britishled Division in Iraq as chief of J3 Operations, and for three years, he commanded the Peace Support Operations Centre in Sarajevo. In recent years, he commanded the 12,000 men strong UN Force in Mali and was later appointed Assistant Secretary-General to lead the UN Mission in Hodeida, Yemen. Following this, he was selected to be Chief of the Danish Army. From May 2021 to May 2022, he commanded NATO Mission in Iraq. Lt. Gen. (ret.) Lollesgaard has, throughout his career, been a leading figure in the development of Danish doctrine and has a broad experience in training and exercise evaluation. At the joint level he has taught component command operational planning at the Danish Defence College and is chief examiner at the Army General Staff Course and the Component Command Planning Course. Privately, he is married to Mrs. Helle Lollesgaard.



Dr Peter Viggo Jakobsen


Dr Peter Viggo Jakobsen is an Associate Professor at the Department of Strategy at the Royal Danish Defence College in Copenhagen and professor (part-time) at the Centre for War Studies at the University of Southern Denmark. His primary research and teaching areas are Danish and Nordic defence and security, the role of NATO and the UN in international peace and security, stabilisation operations, conflict management, civil-military cooperation and the comprehensive approach, strategy and use of force and coercive diplomacy. He also has international experience as a visiting professor at International Studies, Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), USA (2006) and Dept. of War Studies, King's College of London (1996). Dr. P. V. Jakobsen is a celebrated figure in the Danish and international media due to his ability to communicate complex knowledge in an intelligible way to the general public and is the third on the list of the 50 most cited experts in the Danish media in 2022. He is also the receiver of several Danish public dissemination prices (e.g. Meningsmodig Dansker-prisen and Columbusprisen).



FREDERIKSBERG PALACE

Frederiksberg Palace is a historical place with many stories and today also a lively workplace housing the Royal Danish Military Academy. The garrison employs a total of approximately 200 military and civilian personnel, of which around half are cadets. The palace dates back to the early 1700s and was used as a summer palace by King Frederik IV and was the permanent home of King Christian VI.

Naval Base Holmen is a naval station of the Royal Danish Navy, supplementing the two Danish naval bases in Frederikshavn and Korsør. Founded in the late 17th century, it is a visitor attraction with historical buildings that have been significant in the history of Denmark and Copenhagen. For three centuries, Holmen was the principal base of the Danish Navy, but now primarily consists of the naval college and facilities for maintaining the Danish royal yacht. Since the 1990s, the area has been open to the public.
